# BURREN JUNCTION COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BRAIN STORMING WORKSHOP

Let's explore the possibilities!



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## Introduction:

The aim of this workshop is to establish a Burren Progress Association (or equivalent name) to act with the Section 355 Committee (Hall Committee) as an umbrella group for local clubs and groups to work together to improve the town.

To help build capability and resilience by supporting community-based skills that are not just focused on a particular group or organisation and will be inclusive across the community.

This remote agricultural community has been very badly affected by years of ongoing drought. This has resulted in diminishing school numbers, with families of farm employees leaving the district, the closure of the RSL Club, and the closure of our one local fuel station and shop. There is nowhere in Burren Junction to buy a loaf of bread, a litre of milk or a cup of coffee.

The establishment of a Progress Association to work with all the many local groups will aid in coordinating improvement programs, apply for grants, hold working bees etc. At present there are a handful of very active community groups, the CWA, the Fishing club, the Campdraft Committee, the Hall Committee and the P&C who all meet independently. It will be a very positive project to align all these groups with one over-arching group which will help lessen volunteer fatigue and come up with exciting new innovations for our town. Creating such a positive and exciting focus will also build skills and leadership which will stand the town, and the individual people working within it, in good stead for the next inevitable seasonal downturn. This will enhance community identity, wellbeing and a sense of place and become an even more friendly and inclusive community with a stronger social fabric. Local people also recognise the need to improve Burren Junction to make it more attractive for newcomers to come and live and for tourists to visit. There is a need to attract and retain people to the area, both as a source of employees and as supporters to sustain local businesses, now and into the future.

The aim of this workshop was to engage and encourage people with enthusiasm and positivity to gather good ideas and willingness to move forward.



### **Workshop Outcomes:**

The workshop was hosted by community organizer Lucinda Stump, with financial support from a grant for Strengthening Communities. 33 people attended, representing a range of organisations and individuals. It was held in the beautifully renovated Supper Room of the Hall, and the food supplied by a local company, Miguel Catering, was plentiful, and very conducive to a constructive meeting.

Helen Dugdale, the facilitator, based the meeting on Edward de Bono's 'Six Thinking Hats' for running efficient meetings. First of all, everyone brainstormed what they thought were the assets of Burren Junction. Then over the next hour, they were given different coloured post-it notes and one minute to write down their ideas on each of the following questions:

- (2nd) what they thought Burren needed in general,
- (3rd) their 'blue sky' dreams for Burren,
- (4th) what obstacles they could foresee,
- (5th) they were then asked for ideas on specific projects
- (6<sup>th</sup>) they were then asked to prioritize projects
- (7th) then asked how they would like to be involved.

After each of these questions, the ideas were gathered and posted on a whiteboard. There then ensued a 5-minute discussion and a round up of the ideas, before going onto the next topic. In this way, everyone who attended had a chance to put forward their ideas and no one missed out, everyone's opinion was collated and included in this report.
